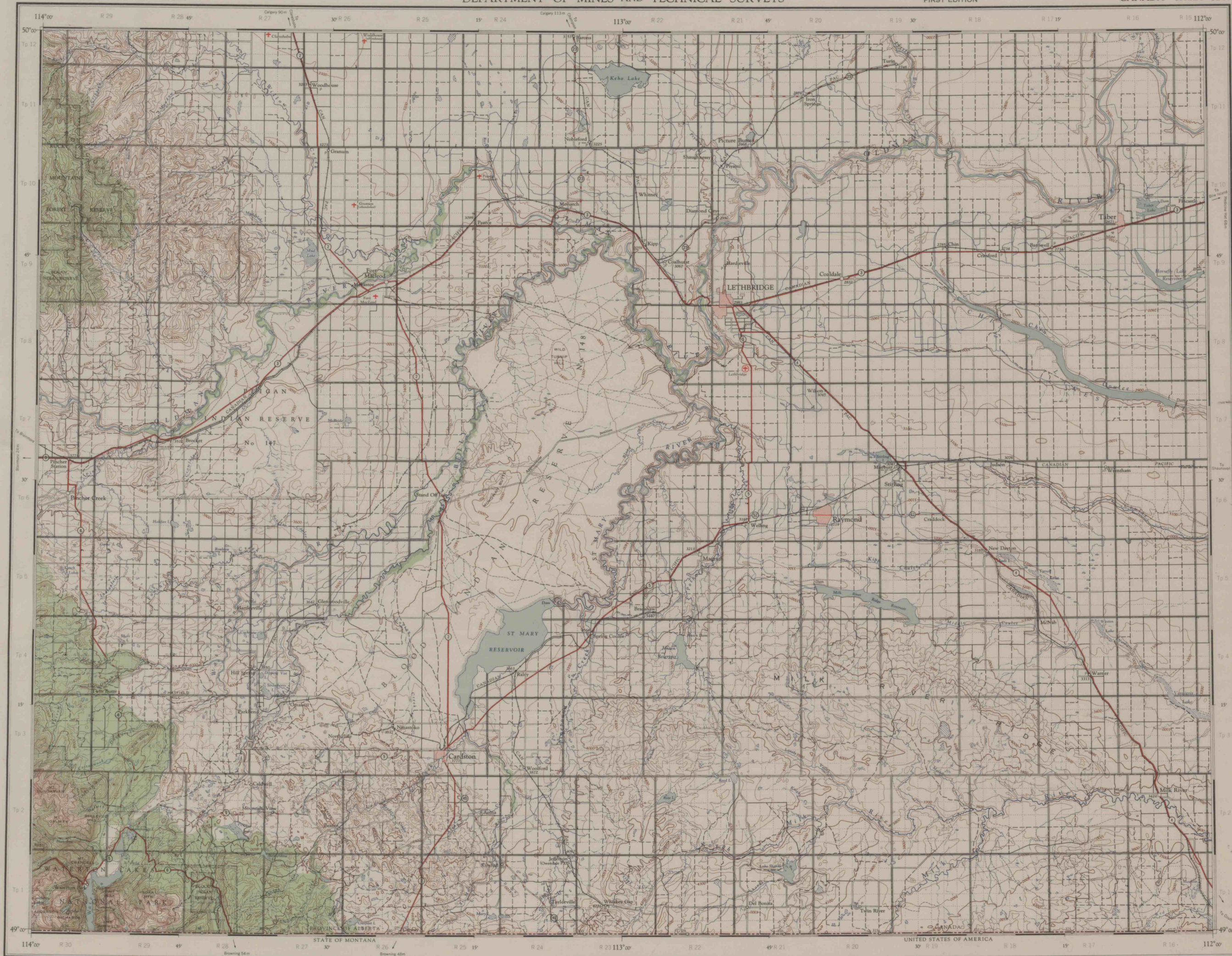




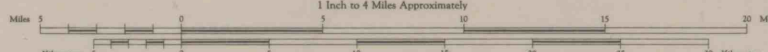
THE DECLINATION OF THE COMPASS NEEDLE, 1954

The declination of the compass needle at any place along a red line is the declination given on that red line. At other places the declination is between those given on the neighbouring red lines; thus at the place marked A, the declination is between 21°00'E and 21°30'E. The declination of the compass needle is decreasing 4 minutes annually.

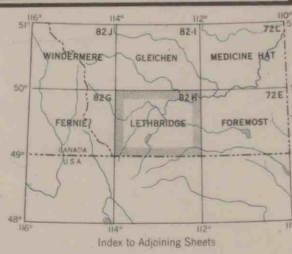
